



PROGRESSION PHASE 1992–2012

The Foundation has launced **Home School Program** in 1996, as one of its pioneering initiatives. These schools provided non-formal basic education focusing on access to education for girls, generally from underserved communities. At that stage, total 21 Home Schools were opened in Karachi, Mirpurkhas, Thatta, and Dadu.

Soon the, Adopt-A-School-Program (AASP) is an imaginatively designed intervention, launched in 1998, facilitating common citizens' participation as caregivers in the revival and smooth operation of dysfunctional government schools in the province. Adopters represent a varied mélange of individuals, organizations and groups including educationists, concerned citizens, local CBOs, NGOs, and members of the armed forces. SEF plays a facilitating role between the school and the adopter, providing technical assistance and monitoring for school improvement.

The Foundation entered into a technical partnership with Balochistan Education Foundation (BEF) and Society for Community Strengthening and Promotion of Education, Balochistan (SCSPEB) in Fellowship Schools Program (FSP). The project spnsored by the Department for International development. The objectives of the FSP were to increase the level of participation of parents and teachers in primary education particularly for girls, and to improve the delivery of primary education. In the piloting phase 20 schools were initiated and then expanded 100 more schools.

Community Supported Schools (CSS) was initiated in 1998, funded by World Bank under the Sindh Primary Education Development Program. The interest of the program was the development of communities through educational initiatives, hence 100 CSS schools were opened successfully.

The Women's Literacy & Empowerment Program (WLEP) was launched in January 2000 in Karachi and Dadu. The Program set up Adult Literacy Centers in local communities aiming to provide basic literacy and vocational skills to women who fall in the age bracket of 13-50. Those women were either never enrolled or dropped out before acquiring formal education. To serve this purpose an integrated curriculum was implemented across the Centers.

In March 2000, SEF embarked the initiation of **Child Labor Education Program (CLEP)** as an enterprise for the 'education and development' of 'working and non working children' who missed their educational opportunities in their appropriate age. In this regard 02 Child Development Centers (CDC) were established in Shehrshah Colony, Karachi and Thatta.

The Releasing Confidence and Creativity (RCC) was initiated by the Aga Khan Foundation (AKF). This Project was initially supported by United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and Royal Embassy of Netherlands (REN). The program partners were divided into two categories i.e. implementers and technical partners. As a technical partner, the Sindh Education Foundation (SEF) had been extending services in the areas of research and advocacy since the inception of the program in 2002. SEF carried out the production of Early Echildhood Deveompment (ECD) resources, ECDPAK website, and other advocacy and resource material. SEF undertook various short-scale and longitudinal research studies, aiming to improve the policy and implementation in the area of early childhood education and development for ECD efforts.

To address a need of context based quality education model, Foundation initiated the Improving Quality Education Programme (IQEP) during 2008-2011 with the support of Open Society Institute (OSI) and coordination of Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP). The purpose of the project was to test and advocate quality education interventions in 30 (Government, Private and Community Based) schools in Hyderabad cluster of Sindh province, Pakistan.



A THRESHOLD TO SUSTAINIBILITY 2008-2015

The sustainability of the Foundation was exemplified by the simultaneous initiation of mega programs, which were strategically aligned with the streamlining of earlier small-scale projects. This cohesive approach not only enhanced the operational efficiency of educational initiatives but also demonstrated the Foundation's commitment to fostering long-term educational reforms.

A significant milestone in this endeavor was the launch of the **Promoting Private Schools in Rural Sindh (PPRS) Program** designed in collaboration with the Reform Support Unit, Sindh Education and Literacy Department - aims at establishment and assist the management of private schools in underserved localities. Under this World Bank supported program, communities were provided with access to educational facilities by supporting private sector partners with establishing schools and a subsidy for children enrolled. The Program provided Oxford University Press books to school children and offers capacity building of teachers/school operators through training and workshops. PPRS run VI phases, being upgraded to introduce IT-based teaching reform instruments, including Audiovisual (AV) rooms, computer labs, and learning software applications delivered through Android-based tablets. Under the program, primary schools were being upgraded to elementary level and so on.

In 2009, SEF launched **Early Learning Program** with the objective to improve early education through qualitative reforms in targeted 150 government schools across five districts of Sindh. The Program manifested to foster children's overall well-being through facilitating positive conditions for development in a child-friendly environment where they can learn through play, experiments and discovery. The households received awareness about education, health, hygiene, nutrition, and good practices, helping them reshape their everyday life.

(SAS) SEF **Assisted** Schools was linked with the history of the Foundation that started out small organisation with initiatives as а home, restricted to fellowship and community supported schools. 2009, "Integrating programs launched during Education Learning Program (IELP)", and "Rural Based Community Schools (RBCS)" and formally launched in 2010-2011. Under that programs, SEF provided financial and technical assistance to schools run by individual and NGOs. SAS was the Foundation's largest scheme which concentrated to establish public private partnerships for increasing access to and improving the









quality of education (Primary, Elementary and Secondary) services. In 2015, SAS underwent major restructuring that emphasized academic quality fundamentals such as school environment, infrastructure, teacher qualification, and availability of Head Teachers, among others.

Schools under SAS reached out to the deepest pockets of underserved areas, opening doors for access to quality education for the grassroots, and a literate future for those excluded from mainstream schooling.




SCHOOL STRUCTURAL DRIVE

In 2015, SEF launched a school restructuring drive. This was in the backdrop of a thorough review of school performances aiming to turned schooling into learning hub. The restructuring has been designed on the fra mework of improved school environment, academic capacity building and modernization of knowledge delivery systems. The restructuring resulted the tansparent and systematic process of school opening to revision of contracts, appointment of head and subject teachers, and elimination of multi-grading in schools. Massive reforms in student enrolment have been introduced with emphasis on rationalization of student-teacher ratio and student-to-classroom ratio (down from 60 to 38 students per classroom). Early Childhood Education set ups, laboratories, playground and co-curricular facilities were vigorously pursueded. Provision of necessary infrastructure for ICTbased learning had also been introduced. This was in addition to the provision of solar panels and hygienic environment with access to clean drinking water and toilet facilities. Since the start of the restructuring phase, there has been a growth of 112 percent in students' enrolment across all SEF schools, with an average of 250 students per school. This was on the back of 30 percent growth in the number of schools.

To be specific, drive pointed to the need for streamlining out-of-shape management structures, demand driven initiatives, strengthening quality assurance processes, and enhancing enrolments in formal and non formal settings. Foundation also aspired to provide quality options for secondary education to the students completing primary education by targeting remotest union councils with low enrolment.

As a result, **SEF Middle / High School Program (SMHSP)** was introduced in 2016, focusing the provision of post-primary education (i.e. grades 6-10). SMHSP offered "Zero Semester" to raise the competency level and facilitate academic development of students as their primary education background was mostly deficient on several counts. Moreover, the program ushered in a strong emphasis on the selection criteria for the Partners to be base range of indicators woven around the quality provision of educational facilities. The indicators included capacity of the schools to offer subjects relevant to higher grades, availability of graduate level teachers, provision of functional amenities, open playground, library, and a strong co-curricular component. The SMHSP later on merged into FAS after restruction in 2017.

In addition to that, Foundation also initiated Adolescent & Adult Learning and Training Program (AALTP) in 2016, which seeks to cater to learning needs of the individuals left out of education cycle. The program was built around components: Education, Skill Development and Microfinance. The of school program targetsed out adolescents falling between the age bracket of 10 to 17 years, and adults falling between the age bracket of 18 to



35 years. The latter focusesd on developing functional literacy followed by vocational training. The former coversed completion of primary education in accordance with Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) defined in the National Curriculum 2006, followed by skill development.

Consiering the innovative approach, the Android based e-learning application that support the teaching-learning process, **Introducing Smart Teaching And Learning (INSTAL)** was launched in 2016. INSTAL envisioned deployment of software at school level through the provision of 21,000 tablet computers to 700 SEF supported schools as well as distributed 30 tablets per school selected through specific criteria.

School operators were involved as equal partners through the provision of a "Tied and Matching Grant" for setting up Audio/Visual room equipped with LED and powered by alternate energy solution i.e. Solar energy. The I.T teachers were then trained by INSTAL Project team. The INSTAL was launched in phases. The project had impact on students learning, enrolment and overall performance of quality of schools.

Teach For Change (TFC) launched in 2017, having the understanding of lack of qualified human resources in the far flung areas of Sindh especially in the context SEF operates its schools. To overcome this shortage of qualified and competent human resource SEF initiated the "Teach for Change" (TFC) program which implies the professional engagement of fresh, qualified and motivated youth to work in SEF supported schools located in different areas of Sindh. Total 78 'Teaching Support Associates (TSAs), selected on merit through a third-party, to bring about a change in the quality of teaching-learning at grass-roots level through subject-specific teaching support in Mathematics, Science & English as well as Mentoring of Teachers with an overarching objective of helping the School Management in overall school improvement.

PROCESS OF SCHOOL OPENING


After the approval is attained, the execution is initiated when a call for Request for Proposals (RFPs) is published in nationwide newspapers in trilingual. Once the RFPs are received, each proposal has to be reviewed and assessed to determine the selected proposal by the evaluation committee. This exercise is targeted at proposed sites to be verified for the schools. For this purpose, sites verification/survey activity is designed within the first few days after the windup of the evaluation of the proposal.

The SEF's workforce participates in the survey under the lead management. As per the scope of the exercise, it is executed across Sindh. Right before the commencement of site verification, orientation session is also delivered. The aim of the orientation is to talk about the tools and parameters about the site verification activity, assigned site to individuals, and roles to each member including lead members. Clustering of shortlisted applicants are also made, and every cluster is led by the lead member.

Generally the senior management attending the session includes regional and dstrict's heads, representatives from P&P and the team involved from programs and units. On different dates and times, the senior management, notably the Managing Director- SEF supervises at least a couple of districts and personally examines the potential situations.

The Managing Director visit different locations along with inspecting the existing schools wherever possible. During the visits, review meeting on enormous but related subjects are carried out by the verification team deputed in all territories. It hold meaningful encounter with the entire work team, delibrations on survey tools, validation of sites through photos, situation of L1, the position of government schools, observational techniques, the accuracy of GPS etc.

The briefing is given to Managing Director on overall experiences, challenges, potential areas and impression of applicants. Team lead shares progress on data, pictures of location, tools and crux of the survey field and key findings. During the visits, senior management further unpackes the insights on applicants, new or existing partners, and ensure transparency. Transparency and merit determined throughout the entire process and remaines till the awarding of schools to successful candidates.





25 YEARS OF COMMITMENT:

Hope On, Journey On!

Sindh Education Foundation (SEF) completed its 25 years of uninterrupted services in 2017 and to mark this historic occasion, on 06 January 2018. Foundation hosted an elegant event of Silver Jubilee Celebrations with the theme "Hope on - Journey on". The Chief Minister Sindh and the Chairman of BoG SEF Syed Murad Ali Shah was the Chief Guest on this occasion. Minister for Education & Literacy Sindh was host of the ceremony. The programme witnessed the participation of luminaries from various walks of life, including: Members from National and Provincial Assemblies, SEF-BoG members, senior bureaucracy, academia, members from civil society, corporate and donor agencies.

On this occasion, the Chief Guest applauded the role and contribution of Foundation for strengthening the cause of quality education among marginalised strata of the society by building sustainable partnerships with private sector. The Hon'ble Chief Minister launched SEF's pioneering intervention relating to ICT based teaching and learning in SEF assisted schools i.e. the INSTAL (Introducing Smart Teacing and Learning). SEF's school partners spoke on the occasion about their untiring journey for the provision of quality education. This was followed by the launch of Autobiography of Professor (Late) Anita Ghulam Ali, the Founding Managing Director of SEF who served the Foundation for completing 25 years of its journey. The program concluded with a lively performance by the children on the theme of "Heal the World". The Chief Minister praised that the Organization which has doubled enrolment in last 30 months has the potential to reach out to one million Out of School Children and must work towards that goal. The Managing Director, SEF Ms Naheed S. Durrani reiterated SEF's mission to strengthen education outcomes in accordance with Sindh government's vision.











REFORMS 2022-2023

The Sindh Education Foundation (SEF) is on the path of expanding, restructuring and updating its program and organizational structures since 2020. A merger of five programs in one "Foundation Assisted Schools" (FAS) program ambit was major shift in program structure since SEF's inception. During the COVID in 2020-2021, SEF profoundly opened 900 new FAS schools in different regions, resulting the expansion of FAS and high rate of enrolment. These interventions underwent a process of consolidation and harmonization, leading to their integration within the overarching framework of Foundation Assisted Schools. This integration necessitated strategic adjustments within the legal and financial frameworks governing these programs. Central to this initiative was the development and implementation of a singular and comprehensive contractual agreement designed to underpin the SEF's flagship initiative, the Foundation Assisted Schools program.

Restructuring of the Programs & Planning (P&P) and Regions

The Programs & Planning Department (P&P) serves as the cornerstone of the Foundation's operational framework. Meticulous attention has been devoted to its restructuring, clear targets that leading to aligned with the Foundation's medium to long-term objectives spanning the forthcoming 5 to 8 years. The restructuring sought to establish an adept and streamlined departmental architecture characterized by minimal bureaucratic impediments. Integral to this reorganization is the implementation of a two-tier management system, entailing centralized oversight at the head office level, complemented by decentralized and empowered regional offices tasked with supervising district-based operations. Such structural enhancements aim to bolster the department's effectiveness and efficiency, ensuring its capacity to meet the evolving needs of the Foundation.

Establishment of Subsidy Management Unit (SMU) and Development of SOPs

Before 2019, the financing procedures for Partners and supported institutions were compartmentalized. Following the restructuring of the department and programs, a Subsidy Management Unit was established. This unit was charged with overseeing the financing of SEF Partners, encompassing per-child per-month allocations, grants, and scholarship expenses to partner institutions. In 2020, a Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) was developed and officially implemented, accompanied by the formation of a dedicated team to execute these financial processes.

Modifications in the Non-Formal Education (NFE) Program

The NFE intervention under the 'Adolescents and Adults Training and Learning Program (AALTP) was reformed with the overarching objective of enhancing program flexibility and meaningfulness in terms of creating value in the lives of learners. This involved allowing variable enrolment intakes and learning hours, enabling Partners to leverage expertise from the market regarding skill components, and fostering synergies with the Directorate of Literacy & Non-Formal Education, Govt. of Sindh, thereby facilitating an easier certification process. The very first cohort of around 3,709 learners were certified ias a result of these reforms in 2021-2022.

Launch of People's School Program

The Government of Sindh established 34 schools through significant investments in infrastructure under the English Medium and Comprehensive High Schools, launched in 2021-2022. SEF was tasked with operationalizing these schools under SEF's public-private partnership modality. Through collaboration with stakeholders including the Project Management Unit and SE&LD, SEF successfully operationalized 32 of these schools, with 02 schools functionalized by the SE&LD. Approximately 19 top education management organizations in Sindh are managing these schools, and within less than a year, these schools reached optimum capacity with a record 3,814 enrolment in the first three months of the Academic Year 2022-23. Additionally, a distinct quality assurance framework has been developed by SEF for this program.

Arrangement for Instructions for Differently-Abled Students

Over 2,500 students are supported under newly established partnerships with partners having expertise in educating differently-abled students.

Development of Policy Manual

Over twenty five standalone policies have been developed for effective and efficient program administration. This was the first compendium of Program Policies and Guidelines developed by SEF based on the reformed structures of the programs and department of P&P.

Unprecedented Portfolio Expansion

During COVID-19 in 2020-21, when the world faced learning losses, the Foundation established 900 new FAS schools through transparent and competitive processes. These schools were established in record time and brought in more than 300,000 enrolment in the academic year 2022-23 which is unprecedented.

Evolving Strategic Partnerships of the Foundation

SEF entered into strategic partnerships with reputable organizations by signing contracts and MoUs for exclusive support and inputs for schools and centers under various SEF programs as well as for the development and enrichment of capacities of SEF teachers, head teachers, partners, and employees of technical units.

The dynamic partners/ institutions in the shape of collaborators having shared vision stood with Foundation in service delivery. The provincial, national and international orgnizations capacity and capability enhanced the impact of Foundation in education sector. SEF iengaged with Asian Development Bank (ADB) and Planning and Development (P&D) for development of the first Education Impact Bond in Pakistan.

Improving Financial and Technical Support to Schools

SEF implemented improved subsidy rates through a progressive implementation aimed at incentivizing post-primary education across SEF Schools. The subsidy rates considerably improved and made contingent on improving quality of schools. The mechanism instituted and implemented by the Subsidy Management Unit.

Promoting Post-Primary Education

To promote post-primary education, the Foundation strengthened and rationalized the criteria for upgrading its schools. From having a 70% portfolio of primary schools, the Foundation in less than two years obtained around 70% post-primary schools, made possible through regular upgradation of schools and compliance of requisites at the district level by field teams to ensure SEF schools provide adequate post-primary education opportunities. Following were the developments considered to the post primary education:

- Upgraded of primary school into elementary level
- Upgraded elementary into secondary level
- Upgraded secondary into higher secondary level
- Established of Audio-Visual rooms in selected schools
- Installed solar power system in schools
- Introducedss IT based teaching reforms

Optimum Utilization and Budget Increase

For the very first time, the Foundation was able to utilize 100% of its budget in the FY 2021-22 and 2022-23. This was achieved by consolidating the budget requirements based on performance in the preceding year and the targets assigned in the running year. Unnecessary budget heads from the annual budget were either removed or rationalized, and the process of consolidating sundry budget requirements by the departments was instituted. Based on effective utilization, the budget estimates of the Foundation, mainly the program budget line, were progressively increased during the FY 2020-24. Around 90% of SEF's budget was allocated to SEF Operations, including Departments of Programs & Planning, Department of Training and Assessment, and Communications, Publications & Research Department; the SEF made history by recording up to 100% utilization of funds in FY 2021-22 and FY 2022-23, amounting to PKR 10.750 Billion and 13.299 Billion, respectively.

Classification of Services

The robust mechanisim applied for the classification of department, including the clear line in distribution of services of General Administration, Human Resouces and Finance Department.

General Administration And Coordination (GA&C)

A systematic approach to procure of services across all Regional Offices was developed, ensured the efficiency and transparency in the acquisition process. The integrated vehicle fleet maintenance and repair services was another milestone acheived which alighed with POL billing, leading to enhanced cost-effectiveness and streamlined maintenance schedules.

Foundation Initiated the redesign and redevelopment of the Education Management Information System (EMIS) aiming to improve data management and analysis capabilities.

The Foundation's head office relocated at NICL and executed the seamless relocation of the entire Head Office, ensuring minimal disruption to operations.

The Professional Development Center was established through signing the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Sports & Youth Development Department and acquired premises for the launch of a Professional Development Center at Gulistan e Jauhar Karachi, facilitating capacity building initiatives.

Human Resouce Department

The Foundation has put many deliberations to dvelop the SEF Services Rules (2021) and later on notified following approval by the Cabinet.

Finance, Audit and Accounts Department

Foundation emphasised transparent mechanisim to be followed on regular audit, and accomplished the audit up to the fiscal year 2021-22 carried out by third-party entities, ensuring compliance with regulatory standards and best practices.

In addition, Foundation demonstrated efficient utilization of the budget over the past three years, resulted in a due increase in budget allocation, indicating prudent financial management practices.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT 2022–2023

SEF's Training Unit has developed customized training programs for teachers, headteachers, and partners, focusing on content, pedagogy, and subject specialization. These periodic sessions are essential for every academic cycle and aim to reinforce teaching materials, academic plans, and workbooks. Additionally, courses for school partners and headteachers have made conciously to promote effective management practices, enhancing the overall learning environment.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ The School Observation and Academic Support (SOAS) initiative constitutes a
 meticulously designed endeavor to assess the learning environment and overall
 operational processes within targeted schools. Throughout the academic
 year 2022-2023, the SOAS activity was systematically executed across 150
 underperforming schools in Sindh. This undertaking allotted two dedicated days
 per school for evaluating the academic milieu, administrative practices, and
 teachers' proficiency in core subjects, utilizing a structured observational tool
 both within and outside the classroom. Moreover, the overarching objective of
 the SOAS initiative is to enhance academic standards within classrooms while
 fostering holistic improvements in school performance.
- ✓ The Sindh Education Foundation (SEF) has emerged as a pioneering organization in advancing Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) and the professional development of ECCE educators. Through targeted interventions, Foundation prioritized the expansion of ECCE classrooms within Foundation Assisted Schools, providing conducive environments where young learners can thrive and lay the groundwork for future academic success.
- ✓ Teachers and students benefit from a comprehensive Scheme of Studies, Student Workbooks, and meticulously crafted lesson plans in the form of Teacher Guides. Primarily developed in English, these materials have been translated, organized, and composed in Sindhi language to cater to the needs of teachers and communities. Similarly, three ECCE manuals, covering six key learning areas, were translated from Sindhi to Urdu, catering to communities where Urdu serves as the predominant language for academic and social interactions.

- ✓ Timely development and dissemination of student workbooks constitute a fundamental support mechanism ensured by the Foundation. Tailored for students from ECCE to Grade VIII, these workbooks aligned with the syllabus prescribed by the Sindh Textbook Board, providing supplementary materials and practice worksheets to reinforce students' learning.
- ✓ In response to the challenges posed by floods in various areas of Sindh, the Foundation swiftly responded by providing Emergency Education Kits to affected schools. These comprehensive kits addressed foundational educational needs and focused on nurturing self-reliance, fostering a sense of responsibility, and imparting essential soft skills crucial for navigating crises effectively.



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ASSESSMENT AND ANALYSIS

SEF's Quality Assurance Framework uses student assessments to ensure educational, financial, and infrastructure standards. The Assessment Unit designs tools to evaluate skills across grades, with expert-reviewed, culturally relevant pre-testing. For impartiality, third parties handle invigilation, E-Marking, and reporting.

Due to flooding in Sindh, assessments this year was only limited to 185 schools in Karachi, evaluating 6,004 students.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ Assessment experts in the field of education have been consulted to enhance the capabilities of the unit. The training emphasized exercises on various aspects and scenarios of assessment tool design, reliability, and validity. The training insights were applied during a "Validation of Assessment" activity conducted in 65 schools across Sindh Custom-made paper according to the objectives of the various programs.
- ✓ Develops high-quality assessment tools.
- ✓ The construction of examination papers utilizes modern assessment tools based on active learning rather than rote memorization.
- Maintaining a balanced approach in designing assessment papers, incorporating a mix of Multiple-Choice Questions (MCQs), Extended Response Questions (ERQs), and Constructed Response Questions (CRQs) tailored to the capabilities of different age groups and grades.



MONITORING 2022-2023

Monitoring and Evaluation Cell (MEC) - a robust cell at SEF is a powerful public management tool instrumental in bringing planned outcomes and impacting the foundation interventions. The Cell mainly tracks progress, efficiency, and effectiveness through systematic and impartial data collection on several key performance and compliance indicators, tools, and processes, if a program has been implemented according to the plan and is getting the desired results.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

 After the natural catastrophe in the region, The Monitoring & Evaluation Cell has conducted a damage assessment survey for 2022 across Sindh. The primary objective of this survey was to evaluate the condition of schools under the foundation's umbrella and plan necessary repairs and renovations to ensure a healthy and safe learning environment for students. Activity insights are as follows;




School Building Damage Status



Electricity/Solar Damage Assessed




School Furniture Damage Assessed





TEACH FOR SINDH-BATCH II

The first batch of Teach for Sindh witnessed remarkable success within the Foundation, marking a significant milestone. A comprehensive in-house research impact study on the Teach for Sindh Program (Batch-1) yielded valuable insights, prompting a reevaluation of various aspects including recruitment processes, deployment strategies, job descriptions, and other pertinent areas within the school framework.

The Teach for Sindh was renamed as Teach for Sindh Program Phase II recruitment of 265 young practitioners contracted through the third-party M/s PDLC. A variety of venues and channels were explored to disseminate the program's philosophy extensively, thereby attracting suitable candidates and establishing connections within universities.

The sequence of deliberations was arranged, to raise awareness about the Teach for Sindh program. These meetings were held with the career development departments and management, additional colleges, and institutions not covered by existing MoUs with SEF. 35 colleges and universities i.e. the University of Karachi, SZABIST, Sukkur IBA University, University of Sindh Jamshoro, Mehran University of Engineering and Technology, and Shah Abdul Latif University, were engaged in these sessions. Information about program features, application procedures, and support services was provided, on encouraging female applicants.

After this preliminary work, rigorous recruitment procedures were meticulously implemented followed by interviews and written tests conducted in Karachi, Dadu, Khairpur Mir's, Larkana, Sukkur, and Shaheed Benazir Abad. The process culminated in the issuance of professional engagement contracts to successful candidates on February 23, 2023. Subsequently, in August 2023, a cohort of 265 Teaching Support Associates signed their contracts and commenced their assignments at Foundation Assisted Schools.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ On February 17th and 18th, 2023, the Training of Trainers (TOT) was initiated, equipping course facilitators with the necessary skills for effective execution of the training program. Lead trainers addressed queries and ensured readiness for program execution.
- ✓ On February 28, 2023, an orientation session was organized, where all relevant stakeholders i.e. Teaching Support Associates, School Partners, and School Heads from respective Foundation Assisted Schools sat together and gained knowledge and insights on the program. The purpose was also to foster collaboration and integration.
- ✓ From February 23rd to March 25th, 2023, A comprehensive 15-day training session for Teaching Support Associates, was completed, focusing on core job functions and program features.

- ✓ Summer camps organized by Teaching Support Associates at their assigned schools aimed to engage students in learning activities while offering remedial classes and capacity-building sessions for teachers.
- ✓ Deployment of 48 Teaching Support Associates to the Foundation's Non-Formal Centers under AALTP during June and July 2023, focusing on enhancing student learning outcomes and conducting capacity-building sessions.
- ✓ A series of capacity-building sessions organized across various locations from July 21st to 24th, 2023, aimed to refresh the knowledge and enhance skills of Teaching Support Associates. These sessions focused on pedagogy-based activities and targeted improved teaching quality and student engagement.

SINDH SCHOOL EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (SSESP)

The Sindh Education Foundation (SEF) provides scholarships for meritorious students through the Sindh School Education Scholarship Program (SSESP) since 2017-2018. The SSESP was conceived to provide students of exceptional merit from the School Education and Literacy Department (SE&LD) and SEF with a specified quota of 75:25, respectively, to pursue post-primary education in prestigious schools and cadet colleges across Pakistan.

The SSESP is a valuable initiative that allows students to pursue quality education in some of the best institutions in the country, regardless of their financial background. Students from government schools and Foundation Assisted Schools are eligible to apply for the scholarship. The scholarship covers tuition fees, boarding and lodging, and other expenses.

Under the fully funded Sindh School Education Scholarship Program (SSESP), 5, 482 girls and boys from rural areas of Sindh are currently demonstrating their academic excellence in secondary and higher secondary grades at prestigious institutes like; Dr. Abdul Qadeer Khan Schools & Colleges Islamabad, Sukkur IBA Community Schools and Colleges, Public School Hyderabad, Public School Mirpurkhas, Public School Gadap, and NJV Government Higher Secondary School, Karachi. These meritorious scholars have emerged as ambassadors of change in their respective communities across the province.





NJV school in support with Sindh Education Foundation operates a massive scholarship program for meritorious students providing a friendly environment by means of accommodation and tuition. The scholarship program of SEF is a fortress of education promoting free boarding school across Sindh for potential students like Vijay Soomro belonging to Far flung areas of Sindh.

Vijay used to stargaze in hometown of Umerkot and was little aware of his passion for astronomical sciences. The Primary school at Umerkot where he was studying with his fellow students had little to boost the passion of Vijay as the school was striving to fulfill basic necessities to provide classroom environment with proper seating arrangement, at times classes used to take place in open sky. Vijay in 2019, came to know about SEF scholarship Program from a senior teacher through an advertisement on social media. The response to scholarship program was not as overwhelming from Vijay's fellows as the scholarship meant long spell displacement from home to a distant place for appearing for the test. Vijay defying all the social norms and other challenges opted for the test reached out to venue that was three hours away from his home town.

ADOLESCENTS AND ADULT LEARNING AND TRAINING PROGRAM (AALTP)

The Adolescent and Adult Learning and Training Program (AALTP) a Non-Formal Education (NFE) intervention of the Foundation, the program is designed to provide accelerated education to out-of-school adolescents who never completed their primary education and adults who missed the opportunity to have access to education in earlier years of their lives. It also has two additional components namely, Skill Development and Microfinance, which are embedded in the program design to leverage their appeal to the targeted beneficiaries.

AALTP provides learning opportunities to adolescents falling within the age bracket from 09-17, and learning and skill training opportunities to adults falling within the age bracket from 18-36 years. AALTP uses the accelerated NFE curriculum that was notified by the Directorate of Literacy & Non-formal Education, Government of Sindh. It has five Packages namely A, B, C, D, and E. They cater to grades Katchi and 1, 2 and 3, 4 and 5, 6 and 7, and 8 respectively. An adolescent who has never been to school can cover primary level Packages i.e. A, B & C in 30 months – 08 months for Package A, 08 months for Package B, and 14 months for Package C and can cover post-primary packages i.e. D &E in 18 months - 10 months for package D and 08 months for package E.

MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS

✓ The MoU with the Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development (ACTED) was signed forthe operational management of 30 Non-Formal Post-Primary Girls learning centers in districts Kashmore and Jacabobad under the Public-Private Partnership Modality. These centers were previously funded by the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), under the project name, Leave No Girl Behind (LNGB). Now, through this MoU, the Foundation will provide financial assistance to these centers to provide learning opportunities to around 1033 girls under its Adolescent and Adult Learning and Training Program (AALTP).







- ✓ Upgradation of Two AALTP-BRDS centers from Primary to Elementary levels.
- ✓ To empower young girls in Sindh and align with the Non-Formal Education Policy (2017), the Foundation has approved a proposal to educate adult female learners (aged 18-25) who wish to continue their education. This initiative has benefited approximately 100 young girls by allowing them to pursue further education.
- he training program for 180 teachers combined in-person and online sessions organized. It focused on equipping teachers with knowledge of the curriculum and effective teaching methods, with an emphasis on managing classrooms with diverse learners.
- ✓ The Foundation advertised the Request for Proposal (RFP) to outsource the management of NFE centers across Sindh. 199 applications have been received from reputable organizations.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS FY-2022-23




The SEF budget for FY 2022-23 was allocated at Rs. 13,299.250 million. The revised estimates of Rs.13,299.250 million were approved by the Provincial Assembly of Sindh. The budget for FY 2022-23 was broadly classified into sub budget heads. These include; SEF Endowment Funds, SEF Establishment/Administration, all program portfolio (comprising of FAS, AALTP, SSESP, PSP) and quality components encompassing Teach for Change Training and Assessment cost, and Monitoring & Evaluation cost.

In terms of the classification of costs, there are three major cost components; Subsidy Cost, School Development Cost and Administration Cost. The Subsidy Cost component comprised 87.50%, School Development Cost covered 3.86%, and the Administration Cost constitute 8.64% of the total actual expenditure for FY 2022-23.




Budget Estimates Vs Revised Estimates for the FY 2022-23






Revised Estimates Vs Actual Expense FY 2022-23

Revised Estimates VS Actual Expenses for the FY 2022-23





Component Wise Actual Expenditure 2021-22 VS Actual Expenditure 2022-23





Actual Expenditure 2022-23 VS Actual Expenditure 2022-23






